Foreword

There are names that have been reduced, over time, to a single landmark. In the case of Anghel Saligny, that landmark became the Cernavodă bridge – an engineering masterpiece about which much has been written, but which risks overshadowing a much larger, more nuanced and more deeply connected work to Romania's modernization process.

The Anghel Saligny – Beyond the Bridge project aims to overcome this limiting perspective and bring to the forefront the extensive dimension of his contribution: from the silos and port infrastructure of Constanța, to factories, docks, warehouses and innovative technical solutions that fundamentally changed the relationship between territory, economy and engineering. We are not talking just about constructions, but about a coherent vision of development, about rigor, experiment, courage and professional responsibility.

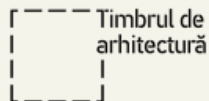
This booklet functions as an introduction to the extensive research carried out within the project and as a guide through Saligny's technical and intellectual universe. It offers the reader an accessible yet faithfully documented foray into the context of the era and the logic behind his great achievements, whetting the appetite for in-depth exploration of the complete research materials.

The project is co-financed by the Order of Architects of Romania, through the architectural stamp, and implemented by the Youth Vision for Society Association, through an interdisciplinary team that brings together expertise in research, heritage, communication and visual interpretation. Through this endeavor, we want to bring into the contemporary world not only the figure of a great engineer, but an entire culture of construction and responsibility towards the built space.

This brochure is an invitation to rediscover Anghel Saligny, but also to a Romania that learned, through him, to build thoroughly, lucidly and visionarily.



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About the project

The Anghel Saligny – Beyond the Bridge project is a cultural and educational endeavor that aims to bring to the public a broader, clearer and more human image of one of the most important figures of Romanian engineering. Far from focusing exclusively on the famous Cernavodă bridge, the project explores a network of works, ideas and technical solutions through which Anghel Saligny contributed to the modernization of the national infrastructure.

Through archival research, historical documentation and contextual analysis, the project brings to light constructions such as the silos and infrastructure of the Port of Constanta, the power plant, the docks and warehouses, but also the less visible processes behind them: the technical decisions, experiments, adaptations and challenges of the era.

The research results are capitalized on through a series of formats accessible to the general public: exhibitions, brochures, guided tours, physical and digital models, visual materials and online content, all conceived as tools for interpreting the technical and industrial heritage. The project does not only aim to inform, but to create a bridge between past and present, between history and the city of today.

In essence, Anghel Saligny – Beyond the Bridge is an invitation to view built heritage not as a static setting, but as the result of applied intelligence, rigorous thinking, and a vision that continues to influence the way we live, circulate, and relate to urban space.





Beyond the bridge

For many, the name of Anghel Saligny is almost inseparable from the Cernavoda Bridge. And this is natural: it was one of the most impressive engineering achievements of its time in continental Europe. But reducing his entire work to a single monumental objective means losing a much richer perspective on his real role in the modernization of Romania.

Beyond the bridge means, in this project, a change of focus. We do not deny the importance of the bridge, but we position it in the broader context of a coherent work, which included port infrastructures, silos, factories, docks, railway lines and innovative technical solutions. It is about seeing the man Saligny not only as the author of a symbolic construction, but as the thinker of a complex development system, which connected the Romanian territory to the European economic and technological dynamics.

This section invites the reader to discover what lies "behind" and "around" the bridge: the processes, experimentation, decisions and teamwork that made possible a profound transformation of the urban and industrial landscape. Beyond the visible spectacle of the large metallic structures lies an applied intelligence, an ethics of the profession and a lucid vision of the future.

Through this change of perspective, the project invites a rediscovery of Saligny's heritage, not as a simple monument, but as an expression of an era that built with meaning, rigor and responsibility.

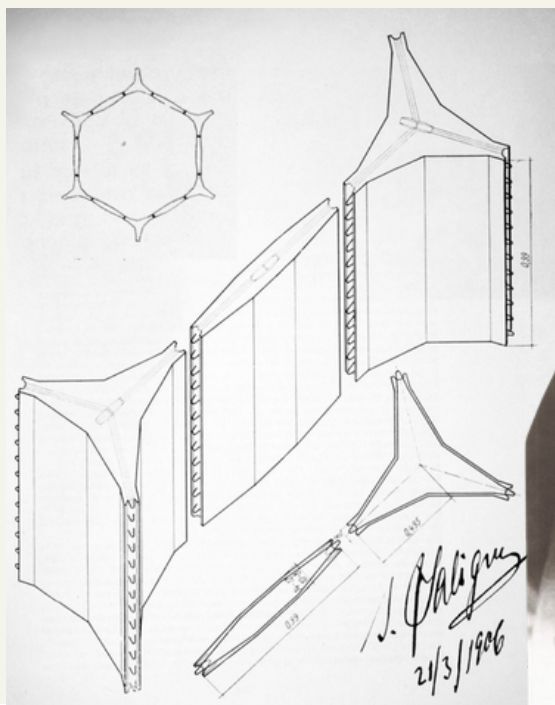


Who was Anghel Saligny – more than an engineer?

Anghel Saligny was not just a bridge builder or a specialist in metal structures. He was an innovator, a visionary and a professional who deeply understood the relationship between technology, society and development. Formed in a solid academic context, connected to the European models of the time, Saligny brought to Romania not only modern technical solutions, but also a new construction culture, based on rigor, experimentation and responsibility.

He introduced the use of reinforced concrete on a large scale in Romania for the first time and proposed constructive solutions considered revolutionary for his era. Each of his projects started from a careful understanding of the terrain, functionality and real needs, being conceived not as a simple one-off work, but as part of a larger development system.

Beyond technical performance, Anghel Saligny was also a man of principles. He promoted professionalism, discipline and respect for the profession, contributing to the training of a generation of engineers and the consolidation of standards that have long influenced the way construction is done in Romania. Through his work, he shaped not only the built landscape, but also the mentality of an era in full transformation.



The era and context in which it was built

Anghel Saligny worked in a period of profound change, marked by Romania's accelerated modernization and the desire to synchronize with the major European trends. At the end of the 19th century and the beginning of the 20th century, infrastructure was becoming an essential tool for economic development, trade, mobility and territorial integration.

The construction of railways, modern ports, factories and energy networks was not only a technical necessity, but also a symbol of progress. In this context, Saligny was one of the main actors of the transformation process, directly contributing to the configuration of key cities and regions, especially in Dobrogea and the port area of Constanța.

His work took place in a climate where science, engineering and industrialization were seen as central factors in the evolution of society. His projects reflect this positive tension between tradition and modernity, between the technical limits of the time and the ambition to overcome them.

Understanding the historical context in which Anghel Saligny worked helps us to view his constructions not just as isolated objects, but as part of a broader process of redefining urban and national identity.



The Teledynamicist from Târgu Ocna

A lesser-known chapter, but essential for understanding Anghel Saligny's innovative dimension, is that of the teledynamics installed in Târgu Ocna. Here, he applied a modern salt transport system that used mechanical force transmitted remotely to optimize the extraction and handling process.

This technical solution significantly reduced the physical effort of workers and increased the efficiency of the industrial process, becoming a clear example of how Saligny thought of infrastructure not only as a structure, but as an integrated functional mechanism. The Teledynamic from Târgu Ocna illustrates his ability to adapt technology to local realities and to introduce advanced solutions in an industrial context that was still at the beginning of its journey.



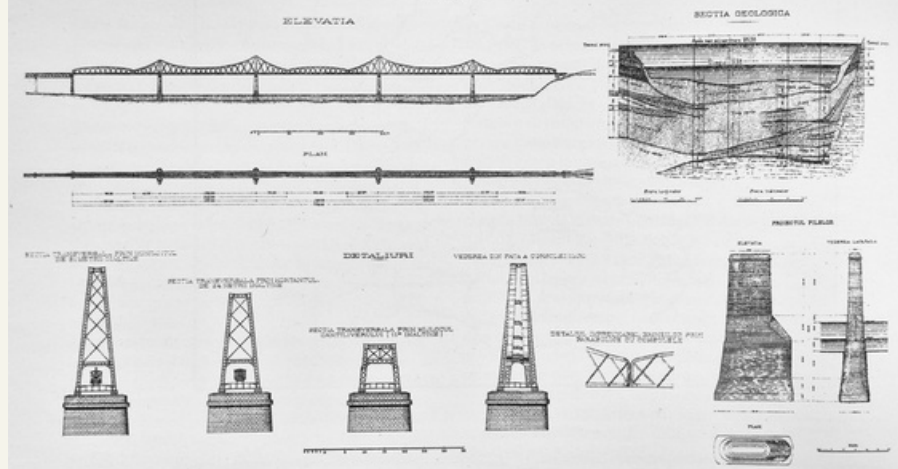
Bridges – founding moment

The construction of the bridges by Anghel Saligny represents a turning point in the history of Romanian engineering. The Cernavodă – Borcea – Iezer bridge complex, inaugurated in 1895, was at the time the longest bridge in continental Europe and one of the most impressive in the world, both in terms of size and the technical solutions adopted.

This ensemble was not conceived as a simple crossing of the Danube, but as a strategic infrastructure meant to connect Dobrogea to the rest of the country and to facilitate the movement of goods and people to the Port of Constanta. Through this work, Saligny managed to transform a natural barrier into a factor of connectivity and development, radically changing the economic dynamics of the region.

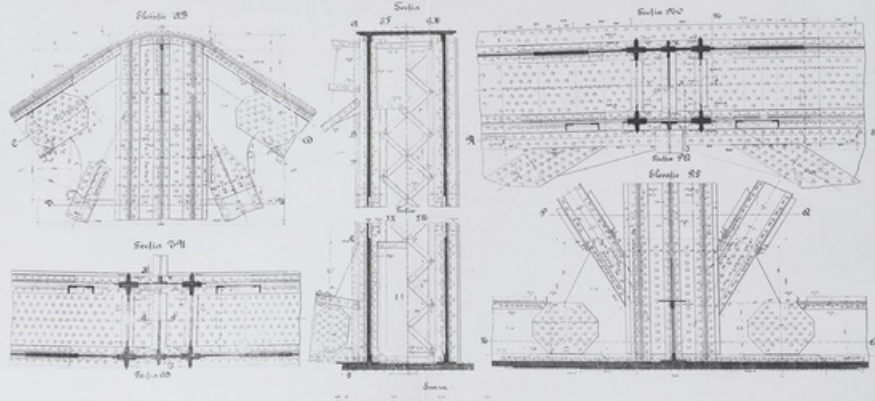
Beyond the spectacularity of the construction, the bridges represented a demonstration of technical courage and engineering vision. They validated Romania's capacity to carry out complex projects to international standards and reinforced confidence in a clear direction of modernization. The foundations, metal structures and innovative solutions used became benchmarks for future generations of engineers.

The Cernavodă – Borcea – Iezer complex was not just an engineering feat, but a declaration of modernity and a cornerstone in the construction of modern Romania, marking the beginning of a new stage of infrastructural and economic development.



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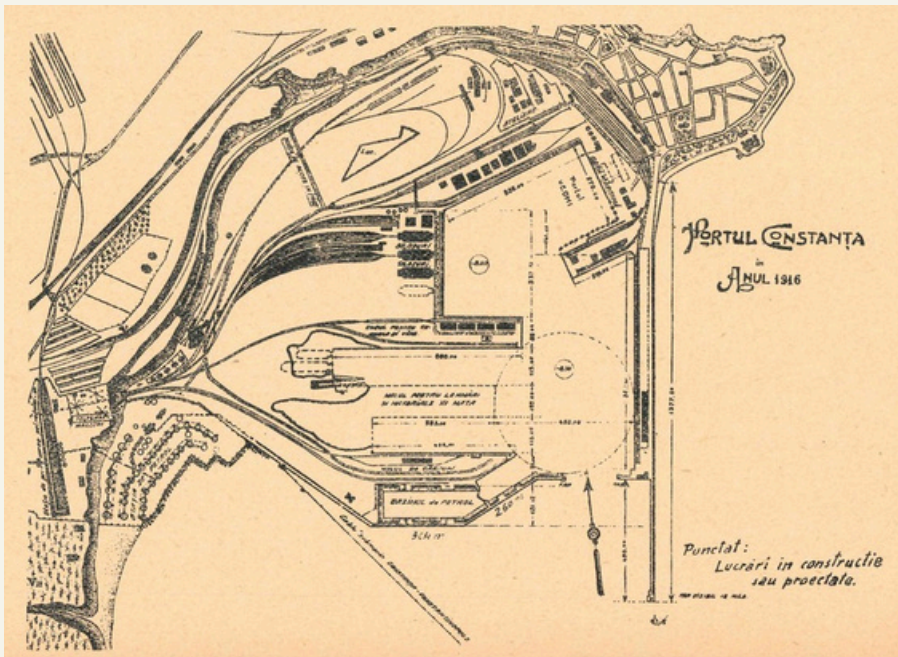


Constanta Port – innovation laboratory

The Port of Constanta was one of the spaces where Anghel Saligny's vision was most clearly manifested. Here, he contributed to the transformation of a port with limited infrastructure into a modern hub of trade and maritime transport, adapted to the demands of a booming economy.

The work carried out under his coordination involved not only the construction of functional structures, but also their integration into a coherent system, capable of supporting large volumes of goods and complex trade flows. The port thus became a space for technical experimentation, but also a model for long-term strategic planning.

Through the proposed solutions, Saligny demonstrated that port infrastructure can be thought of as a technical ecosystem, in which each element – dock, silo, railway line, factory – contributes to the efficiency of the entire ensemble.



Silos, power plant, infrastructure

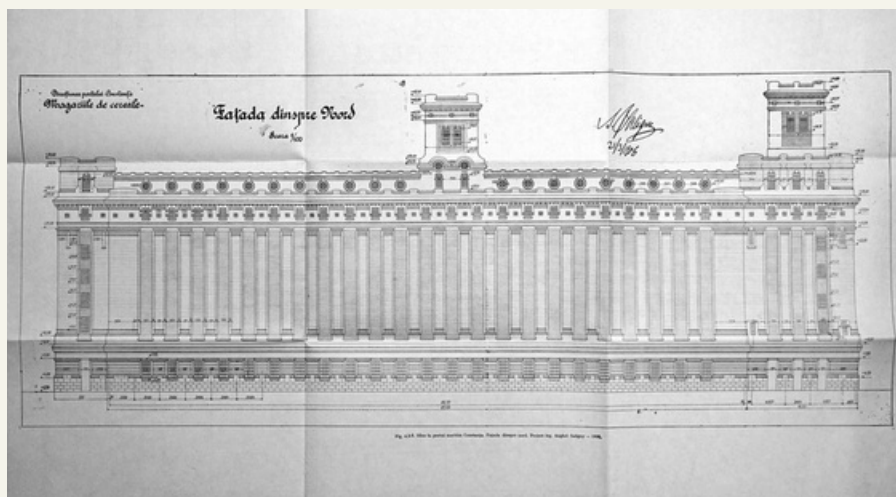
The silos designed by Anghel Saligny in the Port of Constanta represented some of the most advanced grain storage solutions of that time. They were designed not only for volume, but also for safety, durability and operational efficiency, being adapted to a constantly growing trade flow and an economy that was increasingly opening up to exports.

This system was completed by the port's power plant and an extensive technical infrastructure, which ensured the coherent functioning of the entire complex. However, Saligny's role was not limited to Constanța. His interventions also extended to other strategic commercial centers of Romania, such as Brăila and Galați, where he contributed to the development of port infrastructures, docks and spaces for grain trade, consolidating the country's transport and export network.

In parallel with the strictly industrial elements, Saligny also participated in the organization of administrative spaces associated with trade, such as the Old Stock Exchange/grain warehouse offices, essential places for the coordination of transactions, the management of goods and the smooth functioning of economic mechanisms. These spaces confirm that his vision was not just an engineering one, but a systemic one, in which the technical and administrative infrastructure supported each other.

Through this integrated approach – which linked the ports of Constanța, Brăila and Galați in a coherent functional circuit – Saligny contributed decisively to transforming Romania into a relevant commercial actor in the region. The infrastructure he designed became the basis of a modern economy and an efficient organization of maritime and river trade.

These constructions demonstrate how his engineering transcended the boundaries of aesthetics or the monumental, focusing on sustainable solutions, adapted to the economic and technical realities of the time, in which efficiency and functional logic take precedence over visual spectacle.





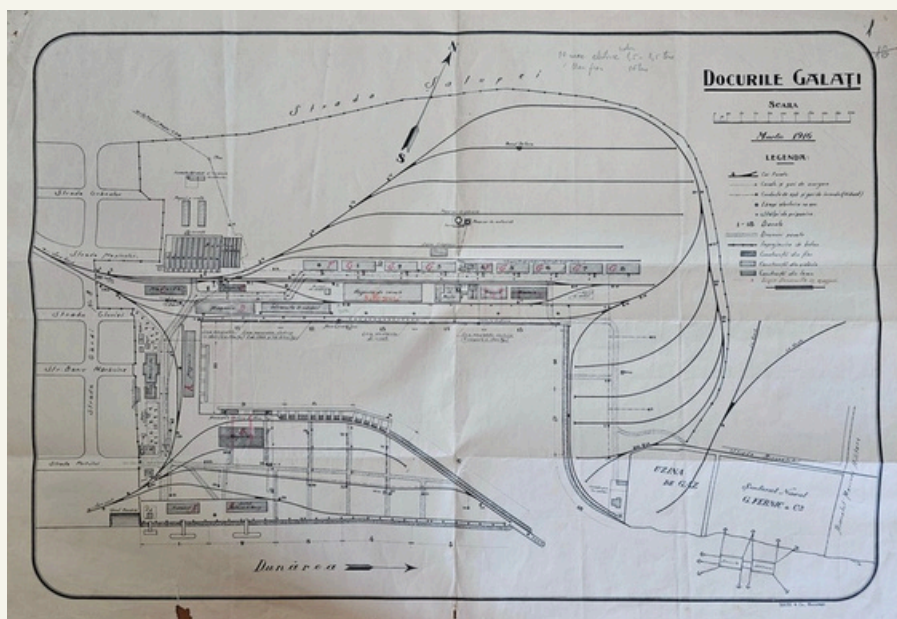
Zilozuri, Port of Constanta

Docks plan, Galați

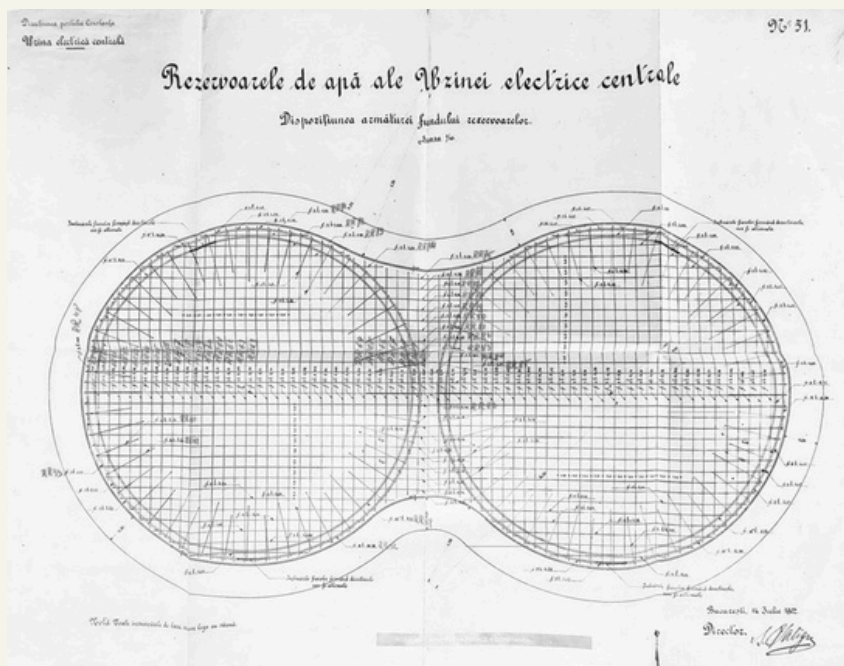
Research fragments – behind the scenes of documentation

Behind this brochure lies an extensive research process, which involved consulting archives, analyzing historical documents, studying technical plans, correspondence and bibliographical sources dedicated to Anghel Saligny's work. This approach was complemented by field visits, direct observation of the buildings and dialogue with specialists in the fields of history, architecture and heritage.

The research has brought to light not only technical data, but also lesser-known details about the way Saligny conceived his projects: from the constant concern for the stability of the terrain and the safety of the constructions, to the ingenious solutions through which he adapted Western technology to local realities. The analyzed documents reveal a meticulous professional, concerned with efficiency, but also with the long-term impact of his works.

Among the information revealed are details about the organization of grain flows in the ports of Constanța, Brăila and Galați, about the logic of the functioning of silos and about the role of the Old Stock Exchange as a key instrument of modern trade. The research also captures the direct connection between major infrastructure investments and Romania's economic strategy at the end of the 19th century, highlighting how Saligny contributed to the country's integration into a European trade circuit.

This booklet offers only an introductory look at the documented material, inviting the reader to further explore the full research and its detailed results, where the story of Anghel Saligny's work unfolds in all its complexity.

Anghel Saligny's constructions continue to mark the urban and industrial landscape of Romania, and his technical principles remain relevant today. Sustainability, functionality and long-term thinking are values that can be read in each of his projects.

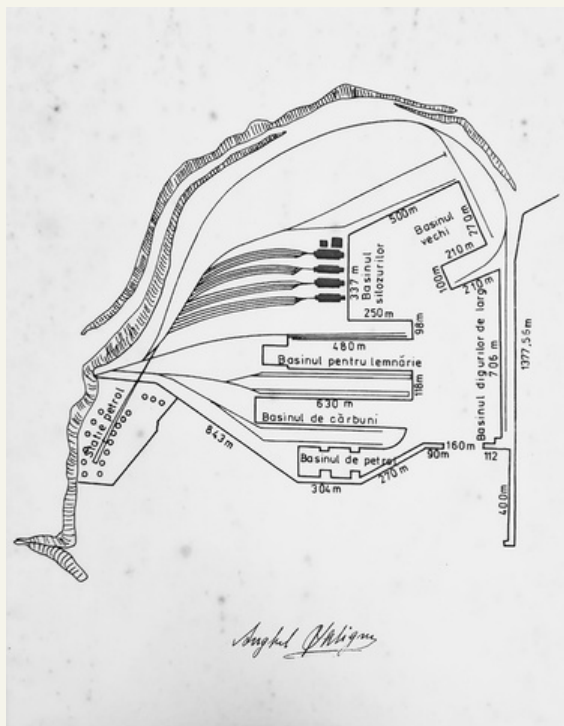
Rediscovering his work offers us the opportunity to reflect on the relationship between heritage, development and collective memory, but also on how our cities can evolve in dialogue with their past.
